Consumer Expenditure (CE) Diary Survey

- CE Diary Survey collects small frequent expenses over a twoweek period using two one-week diaries
- Choice of modes: pencil & paper or online
- Online version was field tested in 2019-2020 prior to implementation in July 2022
- Collects four categories of expenses
- Respondent enters item description, amount, store/outlet, and some category specific fields



Online diary design

- Developed in Centurion (Census)
- Device-optimized based on screen size
 - Desktop/Laptop/Tablet version
 - Mobile version
- Web-based (no data stored on device)





Concerns with usability and data entry

- Need to improve ease of data entry when respondent buys many items from one store
- Inadequate descriptions of the purchase, which require a minimum level of detail for coding
- Bundling: respondents enter "food" or "groceries" and do not itemize expenses



Briefly describe the individual food or drink item purchased such as eggs, orange juice, or ground beef.



Study design



Study Objectives

Autocomplete for item description

- Will this feature affect level of detail reported and reduce bundling?
- Will this feature make it easier for respondents to enter expenses?

Transaction- based diary design

- Is it easier for respondents to enter by transaction (or store) rather than item?
- Would this design make it easier to report expenses when people buy many items at one store?



Methods

- 60 participants, each brought 2 receipts to interview
- One-on-one video interviews on Teams
- Participant opened the diary and shared the screen as they filled it out, follow up discussion with interviewer



Transaction diary findings

Most participants preferred the Transaction diary

- Nearly all participants preferred to see the summary by transaction "Makes sense. It's concise, the shorthand version"
- The rate of bundling did not differ by diary design; instructions had a bigger effect
- Multiple participants had trouble with the workflow for adding items to a transaction

"I don't get it. There are only three things to put in."

A few participants had trouble with the receipt total edit check, which prompts respondents when the items do not add up to the total



Transaction diary takeaways

- Organizing expenses by transaction matches how most respondents think and makes reviewing and editing expenses easier.
- The summary page should present items organized by transaction and show items in the order of entry in any design.
- Improve the workflow from entering transaction-level information to adding items to saving the items clearer to respondents.
- Think about design issues with the use of receipts like edit checks and clearer instructions.



Autocomplete Diary Findings

- Autocomplete was easy to use for most respondents
 - Ran into difficulty when they did not select the right category
- Autocomplete generally perceived to be "right"; Control diary perceived to allow more detail and control over data entry
- Some respondents found it more burdensome having to read the options, choose one, including figuring out which suggestion maps best to their item
- Some respondents found it faster to type without using autocomplete
- Little evidence of satisficing or negative impact on data quality
- Some evidence of learning from the autocomplete
 - Ran into difficulty due to varying levels of detail in the autocomplete database cookies (oatmeal, chocolate chip, sugar) vs. apples (no variety needed)



Autocomplete Diary Takeaways

- Overall, autocomplete feature neither harmed or improved data quality.
- Most respondents find the autocomplete suggestions helpful and perceive them as increasing their efficiency. Some respondents who type quickly find the suggestions more burdensome than helpful.
- The instrument should make clear to respondents that they do not have to select an autocomplete suggestion.
- Respondents who see the autocomplete suggestions will assume that the suggestions are the correct level of detail. Database suggestions should be consistent level of detail.
- Database will require upkeep, is it worth maintaining?

- Misidentification of the Expense Type field as about the Business
- Unsure how to handle a single receipt with **both** Meals Away and Food for Home (*e.g., grocery store hot bar*)
- General confusion over definition of Food for Home (e.g., eating snacks on the go, takeaway eaten at home)
- Item cost field: "total cost" is confusing, change to "cost" or "item cost"
- Some participants transcribed exactly what was on their receipt even when it was cryptic



Next steps

Autocomplete: work on consistency of database

- Transaction diary: improve workflow and handle transactions that fall across categories, perhaps a hybrid design?
- Bundling: try something else such as a popup that activates when respondent type bundling words like "groceries" or "food"
- Receipt use: respondents need more guidance in the diary on how to use them
- Investigate potential enhancements like receipt scanning and apps


Briefly describe the item or expense such as paper towels, textbook, prescription medicine, cigarettes, or electric bill.
