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EMPLOYMENT COST INDEX – JUNE 2014

Compensation costs for civilian workers increased 0.7 percent, seasonally adjusted, for the 3-month period ending June 2014, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today. **Wages and salaries** (which make up about 70 percent of compensation costs) increased 0.6 percent, and **benefits** (which make up the remaining 30 percent of compensation) increased 1.0 percent.

Chart 1, Employment Cost Index, 3-month percent change, seasonally adjusted, civilian workers, total compensation, June 2012-June 2014





Chart 2, Employment Cost Index, 12-month percent change, not seasonally adjusted, private industry workers, wages and salaries, June 2012-June 2014



Civilian Workers

Compensation costs for civilian workers increased 2.0 percent for the 12-month period ending June 2014. In June 2013, the increase in compensation costs was 1.9 percent. Prior values for this series, which began in June 1982, ranged from 1.4 percent to 7.5 percent. Wages and salaries increased 1.8 percent for the 12-month period ending June 2014, compared with 1.7 percent in June 2013. Benefit costs increased 2.5 percent for the 12-month period ending June 2014, compared with a 2.2 percent increase for the 12-month period ending June 2013.

Private Industry Workers

Compensation costs for private industry workers increased 2.0 percent over the year. In June 2013 the increase was 1.9 percent. **Wages and salaries** increased 1.9 percent for the current 12-month period ending June 2014, the same as June 2013. The increase in the cost of **benefits** was 2.4 percent for the 12-month period ending June 2014, primarily due to increases in the cost of retirement plans. In June

2013, the increase in the cost of benefits was 1.9 percent. Employer costs for **health benefits** increased 2.7 percent over the year. In June 2013 the increase was 2.6 percent.

Among occupational groups, compensation cost increases for private industry workers for the 12-month period ending June 2014 ranged from 1.1 percent for service occupations to 2.4 percent for natural resources, construction, and maintenance occupations.

Among industry supersectors, compensation cost increases for private industry workers for the current 12-month period ranged from 1.1 percent for leisure and hospitality to 4.6 percent for information.

State and Local Government Workers

Compensation costs for state and local government workers increased 2.0 percent for the 12-month period ending June 2014, compared with 1.8 percent for June 2013. Wages and salaries increased 1.3 percent for the 12-month period ending June 2014, compared with 1.0 percent in June 2013. Benefit costs increased 3.2 percent in June 2014. In June 2013, the increase was 3.3 percent. (See tables A, 7, 11, and 12.)

The Employment Cost Index for September 2014 is scheduled to be released on Friday, October 31, 2014, at 8:30 a.m. (EDT).

TECHNICAL NOTE

The Employment Cost Index (ECI) measures the change in the cost of labor, free from the influence of employment shifts among occupations and industries. Detailed information on survey concepts, coverage, and methods can be found in *BLS Handbook of Methods*, Chapter 8, "National Compensation Measures," Bureau of Labor Statistics, on the Internet at www.bls.gov/opub/hom/pdf/homch8.pdf.

Sample size

Data for the June 2014 reference period were collected from a probability sample of approximately 43,700 occupational observations selected from a sample of about 8,900 establishments in private industry and approximately 8,900 occupational observations from a sample of about 1,400 establishments in state and local government.

Historical listings

Historical listings that provide all ECI data are available at www.bls.gov/ect/#tables. Included among these listings is one that provides continuous occupational and industry series. This listing uses the Standard Industrial Classification Manual and Census of Population series through 2005 and the North American Industry Classification System and Standard Occupational Classification from 2006 to the present. It provides the official series from the beginning of the ECI in 1975 through the current quarter. Employer Costs for Employee Compensation data

The costs per hour worked of compensation components, based on data from the ECI, are published in a separate news release titled "Employer Costs for Employee Compensation" (ECEC). The next ECEC release is scheduled for 10:00 a.m. (EDT), Wednesday, September 10, 2014. Historical ECEC data are available in summary documents at www.bls.gov/ect/#tables. Since the ECEC is calculated with current employment weights rather than the fixed weights used in computing the ECI, year-to-year changes in the cost levels usually differ from those in the ECI.

Updated employment weights and methodology changes

Fixed employment weights are used each quarter to calculate aggregate indexes for civilian, private, and state and local government. These fixed weights are also used to derive all of the industry and occupation series indexes. Beginning in December 2013, the 2012 employment counts from the Bureau's Occupational Employment Statistics were used. Additional methodology changes include a partial implementation of the new NCS national sample design and adjustments to aggregate seasonally adjusted series.
