For example, a confidence range for the roofers rate can be approximated as follows: 27.5 x .079 x 1.6 = 3.5, where 27.5 = the rate, .079 = the relative standard error (7.9 percent), and 1.6 = the factor for a 90 percent confidence level. The confidence range for this rate is 24 to 31 (27.5 plus or minus 3.5).
