The resident military figure, derived from resident and civilian population data from the Bureau of the Census, was added to the CPS employment total.

There were 33 fatally injured workers under the age of 16 years that were not included in the rate calculations to maintain consistency with the CPS employment.

³ The relative standard errors of the CPS employment estimates can be used to approximate confidence ranges for the fatality rates. For example, a confidence range for the roofers rate can be approximated as follows: 20.7 x .072 x 1.6 = 2.4, where 20.7 = the rate, .072 = the relative standard error (7.2 percent), and 1.6 = the factor for a 90 percent confidence level. The confidence range for this rate is 18.3 to 23.1 (20.7 plus or minus 2.4).
