² The rate represents the number of fatal occupational injuries per 100,000 employed workers and was calculated as follows: (N/W) x 100,000, where N = the number of fatal work injuries, and W = the number of employed workers. There were 20 fatally injured workers under the age of 16 years that were not included in the rate calculations to maintain consistency with the CPS employment.

³ The relative standard errors of the CPS employment estimates can be used to approximate confidence ranges for the fatality rates. For example, a confidence range for the roofers rate can be approximated as follows: 36.3 x .056 x 1.6 = 3.3, where 36.3 = the rate, .056 = the relative standard error (5.6 percent), and 1.6 = the factor for a 90 percent confidence level. The confidence range for this rate is 33.0 to 39.6 (36.3 plus or minus 3.3).
