It excludes incidents occurring entirely off the roadway, such as in parking lots and on farms; incidents involving trains; and deaths to pedestrians or other non passengers.

³ Includes 2 fatalities that occurred within the territorial boundaries of the United States, but a State of incident could not be determined.
