## **Characteristics of Minimum Wage Workers: 2003**

According to Current Population Survey estimates for 2003, some 72.9 million American workers were paid at hourly rates, representing 59.6 percent of all wage and salary workers. Of those paid by the hour, 545,000 were reported as earning exactly \$5.15, the prevailing Federal minimum wage, and another 1.6 million were reported with wages below the minimum. Together, these 2.1 million workers with wages at or below the minimum made up 2.9 percent of all hourly-paid workers. Tables 1 - 10 present data on a wide array of demographic and socioeconomic characteristics for these low-wage workers. The following are some highlights from the 2003 data.

- Minimum wage workers tend to be young. Slightly over half of workers earning \$5.15 or less were under age 25, and about one-fourth were age 16-19. Among teenagers, about 10 percent earned \$5.15 or less. About 2 percent of workers age 25 and over earned the minimum wage or less. However, among those age 65 and over, the proportion was 4 percent. (See table 1 and table 7.)
- About 4 percent of women paid hourly rates reported wages at or below the prevailing Federal minimum, compared with 2 percent of men. (See <u>table 1</u>.)
- Three percent of white hourly-paid workers earned \$5.15 or less, roughly the same proportion as for blacks and for Hispanics. The figure was slightly lower for Asians, at 2 percent. For whites and Hispanics, women were about twice as likely as men to be low-wage earners. (See **table 1**.)
- Never-married workers, who also tend to be quite young, were more likely to earn the minimum wage or less than persons who are married. (See **table 8**.)
- Among hourly-paid workers age 16 and over, a little over 2 percent of those who had
  a high school diploma but had not gone on to college earned the minimum or less,
  compared with less than 2 percent for those who had obtained a college degree. (See
  table 6.)
- Part-time workers (persons who usually work less than 35 hours per week) were
  much more likely than their full-time counterparts to be paid \$5.15 or less (about 7
  percent versus slightly over 1 percent). (See <u>table 1</u> and <u>table 9</u>.)
- By occupational group, the proportion of hourly-paid workers whose earnings were reported at or below \$5.15 ranged from a low of less than 1 percent for persons employed in management, professional, and related occupations and in natural resources, construction, and maintenance positions, to a high of about 10 percent for those in service occupations. More than two-thirds of all low-wage workers in 2003 were in service-type occupations, mostly in food service jobs. (See table 4.)
- Among industry groups, the proportion of workers with reported hourly wages at or below \$5.15 was highest in leisure and hospitality (about 15 percent). About threefifths of all low-wage workers were employed in this industry, mostly in food services and drinking places. It should be recognized that for many of these workers, tips and commissions might supplement the hourly wages received. (See <u>table 5</u>.)
- Among the four broad geographic regions, the West had the lowest proportion of hourly-paid workers with earnings at or below \$5.15 (about 2 percent), while the

South had the highest (about 4 percent). For a number of States, the proportion of hourly-paid workers earning at or below the Federal minimum wage exceeded the national average; in many other States, the proportion was much lower. Some States have minimum wage laws establishing minimum wage standards that exceed the Federal level of \$5.15 per hour. (See <u>table 2</u> and <u>table 3</u>.)

• The proportion of hourly-paid workers earning the prevailing Federal minimum wage or less has trended downward since 1979, when data first began to be collected on a regular basis. (See <u>table 10</u>.)

- **1** Data are for wage and salary workers, excluding the incorporated self employed, and refer to earnings on a person's sole or principal job.
- **2** It should be noted that the presence of a sizable number of workers with reported wages below the minimum does not necessarily indicate violations of the Fair Labor Standards Act, as there are exemptions to the minimum wage provisions of the law. Indeed, the relatively large number of workers with reported wages below the minimum in 2003 includes about 350,000 hourly-paid workers reported as earning exactly \$5.00 per hour; to some extent, this may reflect rounding in the responses of survey participants. The estimates of the numbers of minimum and subminimum wage workers presented in the accompanying tables pertain to workers paid at hourly rates; salaried and other non-hourly workers are excluded. As such, the actual number of workers with earnings at or below the prevailing minimum is undoubtedly understated. Research has shown that a relatively smaller number and share of salaried workers and others not paid by the hour have earnings that, when translated into hourly rates, are at or below the minimum wage. However, BLS does not routinely estimate hourly earnings for non-hourly workers because of data concerns that arise in producing these estimates. At the same time, the presence of a sizable number of workers with wages below the prevailing Federal minimum wage does not necessarily indicate violations of the FLSA or applicable State laws, because there are numerous exclusions and exemptions to these minimum wage statutes. The minimum wage rose to \$3.80 in April 1990, to \$4.25 in April 1991, to \$4.75 in October 1996, and to \$5.15 in September 1997. Data exclude the incorporated self employed. Also note that the presence of a sizable number of workers with reported wages below the minimum does not necessarily indicate violations of the Fair Labor Standards Act, as there are numerous exemptions to the minimum wage provisions of the law. Indeed, the relatively large number of workers with reported wages below the minimum in 1998-2003 includes some hourly-paid workers reported as earning exactly \$5.00 per hour (about 1.4 million in 1998, about 900,000 in 1999, about 600,000 in 2000, about 500,000 in 2001, about 500,000 in 2002, and about 350,000 in 2003); to some extent, this may reflect rounding on the part of survey respondents.
