



Executive secretaries and executive administrative assistants

Provide high-level administrative support by conducting research, preparing statistical reports, and handling information requests, as well as performing routine administrative functions such as preparing correspondence, receiving visitors, arranging conference calls, and scheduling meetings. May also train and supervise lower-level clerical staff.

Cognitive and mental requirements

The qualifications that workers need to use judgment, make decisions, interact with others, and adapt to changes in jobs.

In 2022, more than basic people skills were required for 93.2 percent of executive secretaries and executive administrative assistants, and basic people skills were required for 6.8 percent.

Education, training, and experience requirements

The minimum level of formal education required, credentials necessary, on-the-job training, and prior work experience necessary for average performance in jobs.

In 2022, credentials were required for 9.9 percent of executive secretaries and executive administrative assistants. Prior work experience was required for 93.4 percent and on-the-job training was required for 70.7 percent.

A high school diploma was required for 64.6 percent of executive secretaries and executive administrative assistants.

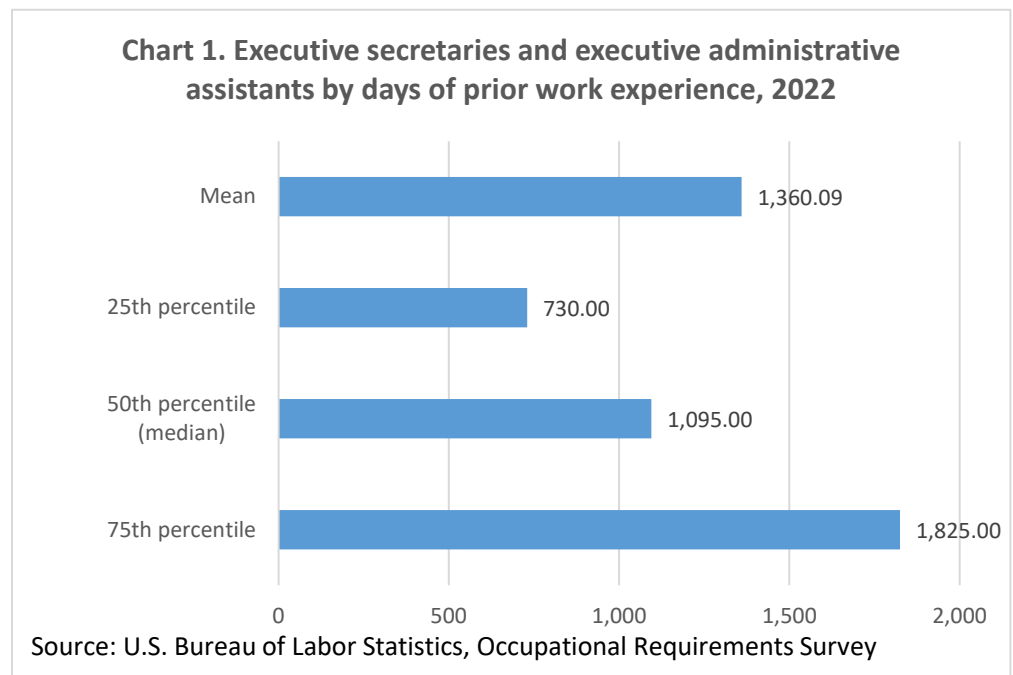
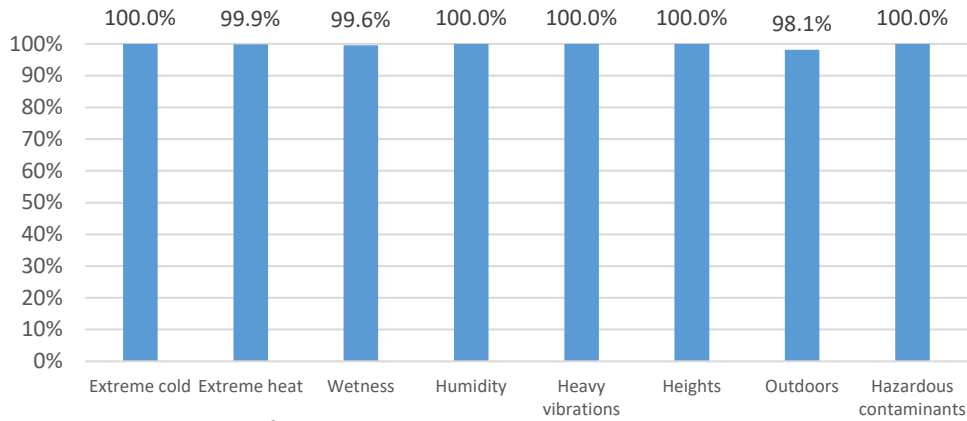


Chart 2. Percentage of executive secretaries and executive administrative assistants without exposure to environmental conditions, 2022

Environmental conditions

The various tangible or concrete hazards or difficulties that are in the vicinity of where jobs' critical tasks are performed.

In 2022, 100.0 percent of executive secretaries and executive administrative assistants were not exposed to extreme cold, and 99.9 percent were not exposed to extreme heat. Wetness was not present for 99.6 percent, 100.0 percent were not exposed to heavy vibrations, and 98.1 percent were not exposed to the outdoors.

Physical demands

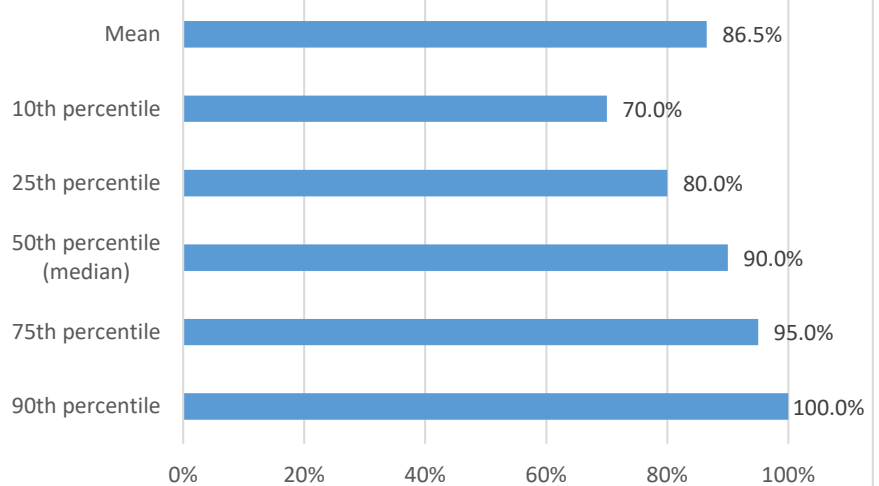
Refer to the physical activities required to perform tasks in jobs. The presence and, in some cases, duration of these activities are published.

In 2022, reaching at or below the shoulder was required for 51.8 percent of executive secretaries and executive administrative assistants and was not required for 48.2 percent.

Performing work in low postures was required for 12.0 percent of executive secretaries and executive administrative assistants and was not required for 88.0 percent.

The choice to sit or stand when performing critical tasks was available to 97.4 percent of executive secretaries and executive administrative assistants. On average, workers spent 86.5 percent of the workday sitting and 13.5 percent of the workday standing.
