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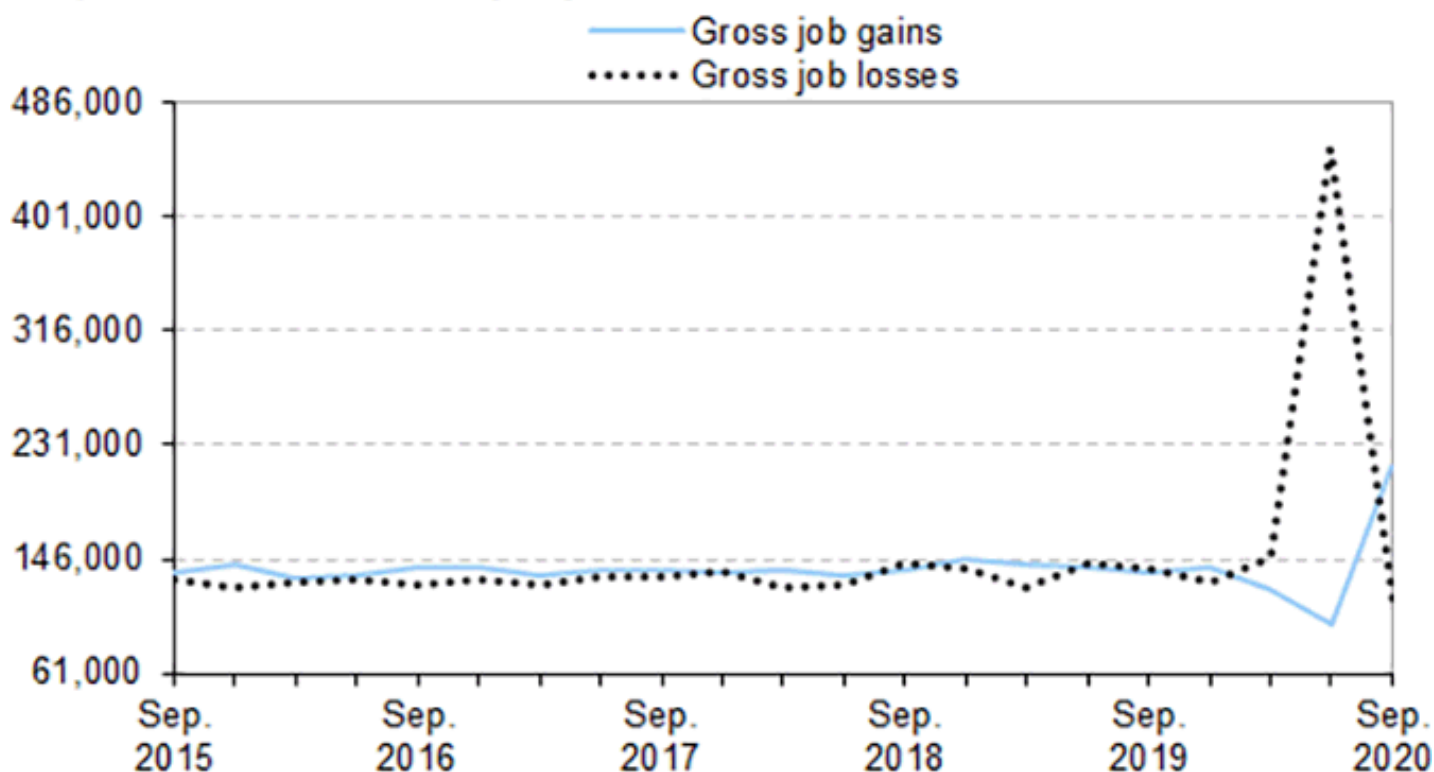
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Business Employment Dynamics in Maryland — Third Quarter 2020

From June 2020 to September 2020, **gross job gains** from opening and expanding private-sector establishments in Maryland were 215,737, while **gross job losses** from closing and contracting private-sector establishments were 117,299, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today. Regional Commissioner Alexandra Hall Bovee noted that the difference between the number of gross job gains and the number of gross job losses yielded a **net employment gain** of 98,438 jobs in the private sector during the third quarter of 2020. During the previous quarter, gross job losses exceeded gross job gains by 353,530. (See [chart 1.](#))

Chart 1. Private-sector gross job gains and losses in Maryland, September 2015–September 2020, seasonally adjusted



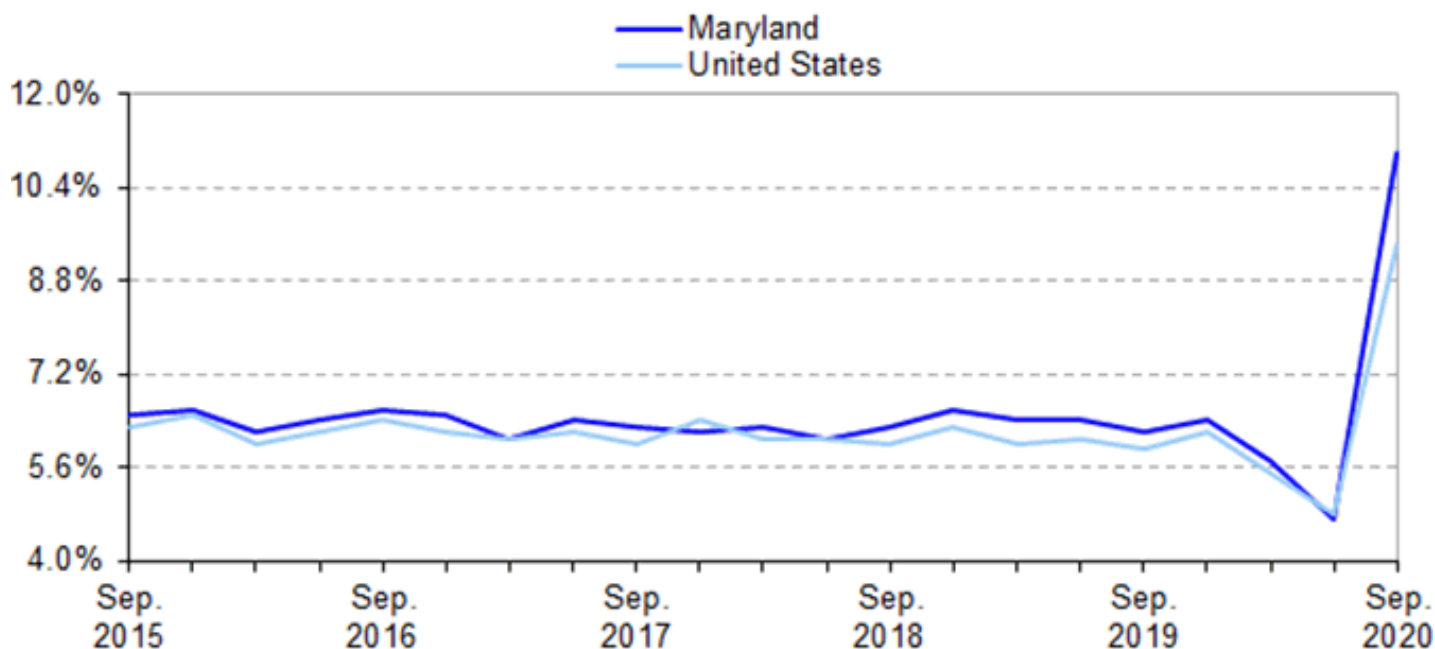

The change in the number of jobs over time is the net result of increases and decreases in employment that occur at all private businesses in the economy. Business Employment Dynamics (BED) statistics track these changes in employment at private-sector establishments from the third month of one quarter to the third month of the next. The difference between the number of gross job gains and the number of gross job losses is the net change in employment. (See [Technical Note](#).)

Gross job gains

In the third quarter of 2020, gross job gains represented 11.0 percent of private-sector employment in Maryland; nationally, gross job gains accounted for 9.4 percent of private-sector employment. (See [chart 2](#).) Gross job gains are the sum of increases in employment due to expansions at existing establishments and the addition of new jobs at opening establishments. In Maryland, gross job gains at **expanding** establishments totaled 173,356 in the third quarter of 2020, an increase of 100,640 jobs compared to the previous quarter. **Opening** establishments accounted for 42,381 jobs gained in the third quarter of 2020, an increase of 17,926 jobs from the previous quarter. Chart 2. Private-sector gross job gains as a percent of employment, United States and Maryland, September 2015–September 2020, seasonally adjusted

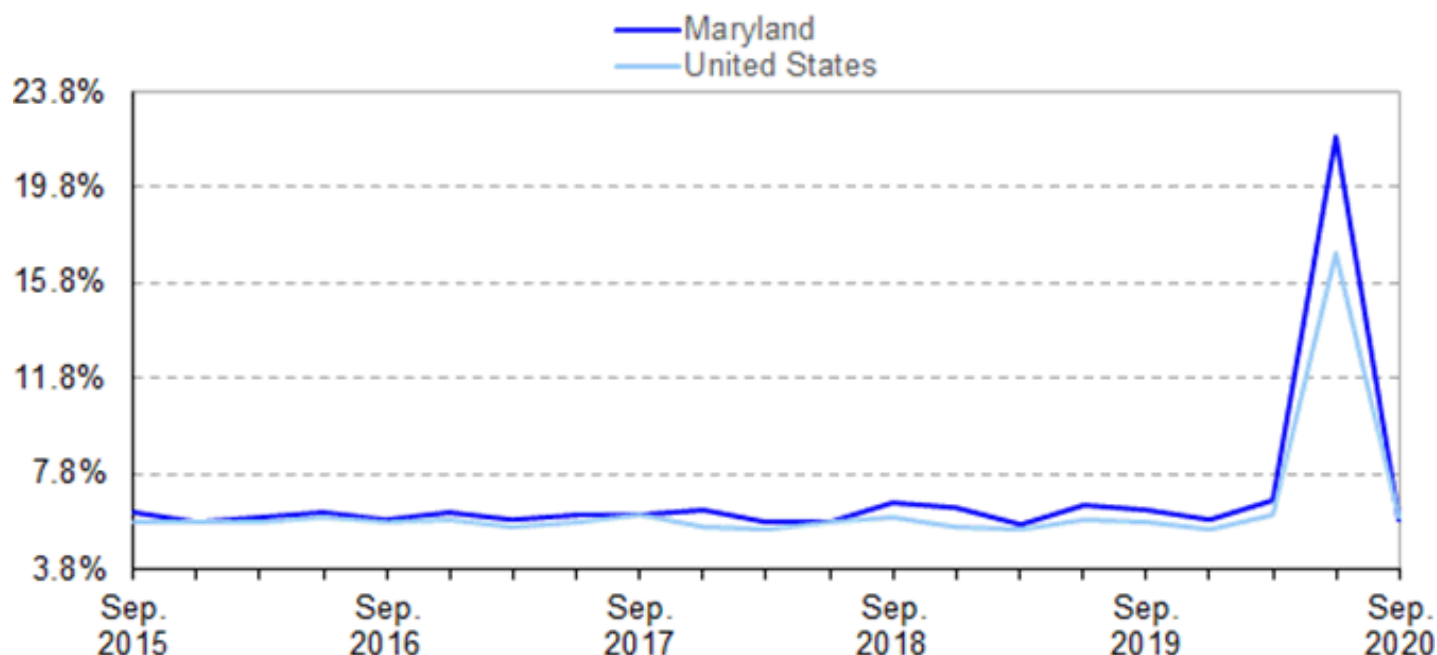

Gross job losses

In the third quarter of 2020, gross job losses represented 5.9 percent of private-sector employment in Maryland; nationally, gross job losses accounted for 6.0 percent of private-sector employment. (See [chart 3](#).) Gross job losses are the result of contractions in employment at existing establishments and the loss of jobs at closing establishments. In Maryland, **contracting** establishments lost 90,755 jobs in the third quarter of 2020, a decrease of 278,447 jobs from the prior quarter. **Closing** establishments lost 26,544 jobs, a decrease of 54,955 jobs from the previous quarter.

Industries

Gross job gains exceeded gross job losses in 10 of 11 industry sectors in Maryland in the third quarter of 2020. Leisure and hospitality had the largest over-the-quarter net job increase, with a gain of 51,153 jobs. This was the result of 64,451 gross job gains and 13,298 gross job losses. The retail trade industry had a net gain of 21,414 jobs and education and health services showed a net gain of 8,635 jobs. Maryland's construction industry had a net loss of 190 jobs.

Technical Note

The Business Employment Dynamics (BED) data are a product of a federal-state cooperative program known as Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW). The BED data are compiled by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) from existing QCEW records. Most employers in the U.S. are required to file quarterly reports on the employment and wages of workers covered by unemployment insurance (UI) laws, and to pay quarterly UI taxes. The QCEW is based largely on quarterly UI reports which are sent by businesses to the State Workforce Agencies (SWAs). These UI reports are supplemented by two additional BLS data collections to render administrative data into economic statistics. Together these data comprise the QCEW and form the basis of the Bureau's establishment universe sampling frame.

In the BED program, the QCEW records are linked across quarters to provide a longitudinal history for each establishment. The linkage process allows the tracking of net employment changes at the establishment level, which in turn allows the estimation of jobs gained at opening and expanding units and jobs lost at closing and contracting units.

The change in the number of jobs over time is the net result of increases and decreases in employment that occur at all businesses in the economy. BED statistics track these changes in employment at private business establishments from the third month of one quarter to the third month of the next. Gross job gains are the sum of increases in employment from expansions at existing establishments and the addition of new jobs at opening establishments. Gross job losses are the result of contractions in employment at existing establishments and the loss of jobs at closing establishments. The difference between the number of gross jobs gained and the number of gross jobs lost is the net change in employment.

Gross job gains and gross job losses are expressed as rates by dividing their levels by the average of employment in the current and previous quarters. The rates are calculated for the components of gross job gains and gross job losses and then summed to form their respective totals. These rates can be added and subtracted just as their levels can. For instance, the difference between the gross job gains rate and the gross job losses rate is the net growth rate.

The formal definitions of employment changes are as follows:

Openings. These are either units with positive third month employment for the first time in the current quarter, with no links to the prior quarter, or with positive third month employment in the current quarter following zero employment in the previous quarter.

Expansions. These are units with positive employment in the third month in both the previous and current quarters, with a net increase in employment over this period.

Closings. These are either units with positive third month employment in the previous quarter, with no employment or zero employment reported in the current quarter.

Contractions. These are units with positive employment in the third month in both the previous and current quarters, with a net decrease in employment over this period.
