

# Business Employment Dynamics in Nebraska — Second Quarter 2020

From March 2020 to June 2020, **gross job gains** from opening and expanding private-sector establishments in Nebraska were 38,885, while **gross job losses** from closing and contracting private-sector establishments were 96,697, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today. Regional Commissioner Jason Palmer noted that the difference between the number of gross job gains and the number of gross job losses yielded a **net employment loss** of 57,812 jobs in the private sector during the second quarter of 2020. During the previous quarter, gross job losses exceeded gross job gains by 2,188. (See chart 1.)

Chart 1. Private sector gross job gains and losses in Nebraska, June 2015–June 2020, seasonally adjusted





The change in the number of jobs over time is the net result of increases and decreases in employment that occur at all private businesses in the economy. Business Employment Dynamics (BED) statistics track these changes in employment at private-sector establishments from the third month of one quarter to the third month of the next. The difference between the number of gross job gains and the number of gross job losses is the net change in employment. (See Technical Note.)

## **Gross job gains**

In the second quarter of 2020, gross job gains represented 4.9 percent of private-sector employment in Nebraska; nationally, gross job gains accounted for 4.8 percent of private-sector employment. (See chart 2.) Gross job gains are the sum of increases in employment due to expansions at existing establishments and the addition of new jobs at opening establishments. In Nebraska, gross job gains at **expanding** establishments totaled 31,516 in the second quarter of 2020, a decrease of 8,128 jobs compared to the previous quarter. (See table 1.) **Opening** establishments accounted for 7,369 jobs gained in the second quarter of 2020, a decrease of 630 jobs from the previous quarter.

Chart 2. Private sector gross job gains as a percent of employment, United States and Nebraska, June 2015–June 2020, seasonally adjusted



### **Gross job losses**

In the second quarter of 2020, gross job losses represented 12.1 percent of private-sector employment in Nebraska; nationally, gross job losses accounted for 17.0 percent of private-sector employment. (See chart 3.) Gross job losses are the result of contractions in employment at existing establishments and the loss of jobs at closing establishments. In Nebraska, contracting establishments lost 84,693 jobs in the second quarter of 2020, an increase of 42,788 jobs from the prior quarter. Closing establishments lost 12,004 jobs, an increase of 4,078 jobs from the previous quarter.

### **Industries**

Gross job losses exceeded gross job gains in all 10 industry sectors in Nebraska in the second quarter of 2020. Leisure and hospitality had the largest over-the-quarter net job decrease, with a loss of 23,770 jobs. This was the result of 4,953 gross job gains and 28,723 gross job losses. Professional and business services showed the second-largest net job loss (-7,757), followed by retail trade (-6,129) and education and health services (-5,306). Job losses among the remaining sectors ranged from 4,323 in manufacturing to 1,279 in wholesale trade.

## **Technical Note**

The Business Employment Dynamics (BED) data are a product of a federal-state cooperative program known as Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW). The BED data are compiled by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) from existing QCEW records. Most employers in the U.S. are required to file quarterly reports on the employment and wages of workers covered by unemployment insurance (UI) laws, and to pay quarterly UI taxes. The QCEW is based largely on quarterly UI reports which are sent by businesses to the State Workforce Agencies (SWAs). These UI reports are supplemented by two additional BLS data collections to render administrative data into economic statistics. Together these data comprise the QCEW and form the basis of the Bureau's establishment universe sampling frame.

In the BED program, the QCEW records are linked across quarters to provide a longitudinal history for each establishment. The linkage process allows the tracking of net employment changes at the establishment level, which in turn allows the estimation of jobs gained at opening and expanding units and jobs lost at closing and contracting units.

The change in the number of jobs over time is the net result of increases and decreases in employment that occur at all businesses in the economy. BED statistics track these changes in employment at private business establishments from the third month of one quarter to the third month of the next. Gross job gains are the sum of increases in employment from expansions at existing establishments and the addition of new jobs at opening establishments. Gross job losses are the result of contractions in employment at existing establishments and the loss of jobs at closing establishments. The difference between the number of gross jobs gained and the number of gross jobs lost is the net change in employment.

Gross job gains and gross job losses are expressed as rates by dividing their levels by the average of employment in the current and previous quarters. The rates are calculated for the components of gross job gains and gross job losses and then summed to form their respective totals. These rates can be added and subtracted just as their levels can. For instance, the difference between the gross job gains rate and the gross job losses rate is the net growth rate.

The formal definitions of employment changes are as follows:

*Openings*. These are either units with positive third month employment for the first time in the current quarter, with no links to the prior quarter, or with positive third month employment in the current quarter following zero employment in the previous quarter.

*Expansions*. These are units with positive employment in the third month in both the previous and current quarters, with a net increase in employment over this period.

*Closings*. These are either units with positive third month employment in the previous quarter, with no employment or zero employment reported in the current quarter.

*Contractions*. These are units with positive employment in the third month in both the previous and current quarters, with a net decrease in employment over this period.
