Policymakers often use them directly in planning programs, and news organizations often report their main findings to the general public. Increased awareness of issues facing your generation then becomes a catalyst for improvement.

One of the unique features of the NLS among U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) surveys is its ability to calculate the total number of jobs people hold during their work life. NLS can only estimate such a measure because it interviews the same people over the course of their entire work life and keeps track of all the jobs they have held. As of the 19th round of the NLSY97, your age group held an average of 8.6 jobs from age 18 through age 34. Look for the 20th round of the NLSY97 news release in spring 2024...
